22	CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: John Timmerman,
23	here.
24	SECRETARY STACY: Okay. All right. Allen
25	Township Zoning Commission, June 13th, 2024.

Deb Stacy, John Timmerman. Darrin Rehus arrived at
5:52 p.m.

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Deb Stacy, Allen Township Zoning Commission Secretary, read the June 5th, 2024, minutes.

Motion 24-04-47-M. John Timmerman moved to approve the Allen Township Zoning Commission minutes from the June 5th, 2024, meeting. Clara Pargeon moved to second the motion. The motion passed.

The Allen Township Zoning Commission will be preparing for the upcoming public hearing which will be held on Friday, July 5th, 2024, at 6:30 p.m. at the Allen Township Center.

The next Allen Township Zoning Commission meeting will be held on June 20th, 2024, at 5:00 p.m.

The Proposed Zoning Resolutions and Maps can be viewed or received from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. that day.

Discussion regarding a mailer to Allen Township residents and details pertaining to the hearing were also addressed.

Motion 24-4-48-M. John Timmerman moved to adjourn the meeting. Clara Pargeon seconded the motion. Motion passed.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: I move to accept the meeting minutes as read.

view or print off the Zoning Resolution and map, or

people can stop by on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 6:00 to 7:00 through July 2nd.

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They can either look at it. They can pick one up for the Resolution and Map. And I even have the fiscal officer's cell phone number; he gave me permission to use that.

And, then, on the mailing side of it, it has the postage and it will have, like, the residents here and, then, just kind of a reminder of what the two public hearing dates are.

And it ended up that these are going to go to registered voters. We -- I attempted to -- or I did look into Every Door Direct Mailing, and that really was not a user-friendly option. You had to look at a map that did not have clearly marked roads or streets and it was by mail routes. So what happens is you could -- some of those folks would be in Allen Township and some of them would not. And so I was -- I worked with Teresa at Marbee Printing; she was very helpful. And so that didn't seem to be a good choice.

So, then, we attempted to purchase a mailing list of all Allen Township residents and gave it some time and that -- they weren't pulling what they should have been pulling. We could tell by the numbers that it wasn't correct information. It was for Hancock

So basically what they're saying, the Ag
District is primarily for farming. So if someone does
get a 2-acre parcel, gets a septic tank, they can -permit, they can build a home, but it's -- the first
and foremost use is for Ag. So is that how you
interpret that? I guess I didn't want someone to read
that and not have a clear understanding of what that
was saying.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: I would think that "accessory to farming operations" could be removed because it doesn't have to be -- that was not the intent of it.

SECRETARY STACY: Right.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: I mean, because we

-- they tried to -- they tried to combine two
sections; one that said "accessory to farming
operations," and one that said just the "single-family
dwelling was the primary use." They tried to combine

 operations" stayed in there.

SECRETARY STACY: -- it reads different to someone else and we want it to be clear to everybody.

So we would want to -- let's see. So maybe on Page 43 we would also reference the --

MS. PARGEON: Well, the Planned Unit Development. Stick it in there.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Well, no. Planned Unit Development is if you're developing a whole neighborhood.

SECRETARY STACY: That's a whole lot of different things.

MS. PARGEON: Okay.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: I think maybe the Minimum Floor Area. I mean, that's the only one that -- that's the only section on the Schedule of Regulations that talks about the structure itself. I guess you've got to have minimum height as well. But the rest of it is like the lot, how many acres, what your setbacks are.
