One says you're denying -- that you recommend they deny it and don't go forward with zoning, and -- which I think is a waste of paper, but if I don't do it, somebody will say it was preordained what we were going to do. And it's just some common sense there, if you guys worked this hard, you're probably not going to say don't do it. And, then, the other one is that you're sending a modified version.

SECRETARY STACY: Gotcha.

MS. LAND: If you make any changes, the modifications will be attached to that Resolution and then that Resolution and the book all go on.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Okay.

MS. LAND: So the book stays the same with those modifications attached to it when it goes to the trustees.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Does it stay that way forever?

MS. LAND: No.

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CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So -- okay.

MS. LAND: Well, if the trustees decide that they want to do -- if they want to accept your recommendation for modifications, then they get incorporated into the book before it goes to the Board of Elections.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Okay.

MS. LAND: We can't add them onto the book because what if the trustees say, We don't want to do those modifications --

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Sure.

MS. LAND: -- then we've got to take them back out. So this way they are there for anybody to see what your suggested changes are and they can compare the two.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: And it's not an all or nothing on the trustees' part. They can pick and choose what pieces.

future growth is not allowed to protect every -- you know, just for protecting everybody.

I was giving that thought and I don't have an answer yet. But as far as -- and this is something we can discuss tonight. I'm sure it will be a topic as people come in on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and it would be something that we could present at our hearing as well.

I think we would all love to see it available for a small business to be able to expand. So I thought if we did -- they are allowed growth and we can determine what, you know, percentage, or whatever. But they would be required to follow -- they would be limited by the Schedule of Regulations, so you'd be forced to meet your setbacks and your height limits and your bulk, and whatever is all in there.

MS. PARGEON: Lot coverage.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Lot coverage. You would be forced to meet --

SECRETARY STACY: Required.

22 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: What's that?

23 Required. Yeah. Sorry.

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24 MS. LAND: No forcing.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: And that would be for the district you're located in. So not -- I mean, just because you are a business, if you want to be following B-1 or B-2 or B-3, if you're located in Agricultural, you would be following the setbacks of Agricultural, is my thought process. Still open for con -- open for debate or whatever.

SECRETARY STACY: Okay.

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CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: You would have to meet all of the General Provisions, General Exceptions. We have a section that's Items Not Allowed In Any District, so they would have to meet that stuff. Basically if you could meet the rules of the -- of the book, you know.

MS. PARGEON: They would be okay.

SECRETARY STACY: Once you assign a percentage?

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: I think -- I think a percentage is completely fine to assign.

MS. LAND: The blue books that I gave you yesterday, I did write it up with a percentage in it because I was not sure which we were going.

SECRETARY STACY: Where would that be at?

MS. LAND: It would be on page --

at that first meeting when we were talking about it when Dave was bringing up about a neighbor that has a small shop.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Yeah.

SECRETARY STACY: Right.

MS. LAND: But it was the building that could be increased, but not the use of the land more.

MS. PARGEON: Right.

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MS. LAND: So it's the Nonconforming
Structures. And doing -- the way we have it written
now, the 50 percent, people can build onto houses that
are nonconforming because a house is built in a
business district, something you had zoned Business or
Industrial, is a nonconforming use. You don't want to
limit them to not even being able to put a deck on or
a sunroom or something if they want to. We had that
kind of discussion that night that did get put in here
that we have that able for 50 percent.

And then, the next one is a Nonconforming
Use of Structures and Land. Which is -- it's the use
of the structure and the land in combination. It's
kind of a minor-sounding detail, but it's a big
difference.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So, basically, in

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Kind of like the blue book is?

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MS. LAND: Yeah. The blue book had them both matching. They mirrored each other. The red book, they are different. I took the --

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Right.

MS. LAND: -- second one back to the no ability to grow. But the first one for nonconforming structures, they can grow, as long as they don't increase the amount nonconforming.

So if you have something that's a house too close to the lot line so it's nonconforming, it can increase -- have an addition; the addition has to have the proper setbacks. So it can't just come out exactly flush with the house and might have to be offset.

SECRETARY STACY: Okay.

MS. LAND: If the house is already too tall for the area, so it's a nonconforming use, then any addition would have to be lower. It would have to be not as tall as rest of the house.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So can you give me a quick explanation as to the difference between nonconforming structures --

1 MS. LAND: No. 2. CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: -- and nonconforming 3 uses of structures and land? MS. LAND: I can do an outline and so sort 4 5 of a comparison thing. I was thinking about that this 6 afternoon when I was trying to work them out, but 7 didn't do them yet. 8 SECRETARY STACY: That's fine. 9 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: But you can get us something to help us understand what's the difference. 10 11 Because, to me, at a quick glance --12 MS. LAND: They look the same, I know. But 13 they are slightly, and I think they are slightly 14 different because of case law that's made them 15 different throughout the years. 16 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So a nonconforming 17 structure, Section 2, Nonconforming Structures, would 18 be --

MS. LAND: A house that's in the wrong place.

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CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: A house that's in the wrong place. A Nonconforming Uses of Structures and Land would be?

MS. LAND: A house that's in the wrong

- 1 district.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So this first one is
- 3 | a house that's located on the wrong section -- portion
- 4 of it.
- 5 MS. LAND: Close to the edge.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Too close to the
- 7 parcel. But still belongs -- the house belongs in
- 8 that district.
- 9 MS. LAND: Yeah.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So that would be
- 11 that scenario.
- MS. LAND: You're right. We still do have
- 13 it that a house that's in an area that is zoned where
- 14 a house couldn't normally be in any of the Business
- 15 Districts, or in the Industrial District, you can't
- 16 have a house.
- 17 | SECRETARY STACY: Right.
- 18 MS. LAND: So those would be nonconforming
- 19 and not able to grow.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: The way it's
- 21 | currently written in the red book.
- 22 MS. LAND: In the red book. Correct.
- CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: If we adopted
- 24 | something similar to what was in the blue book --

Page 60 1 MS. LAND: Then --CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: -- you could --MS. LAND: -- they would be able to grow. CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: They would be able 4 5 to grow. A business would be able to grow that's in 6 the Agricultural District? 7 MS. LAND: Yes. 8 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: He'd be able to 9 grow. 10 SECRETARY STACY: Would it apply to any 11 district? 12 MS. LAND: Yes. 13 SECRETARY STACY: Yes. 14 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: But they would have 15 to follow the --16 SECRETARY STACY: Setbacks. 17 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: -- the setbacks, the 18 height. 19 SECRETARY STACY: Right. Right. 20 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: At which point, if 2.1 you're --2.2 MS. LAND: We put in that -- there's a line in here that whatever their increase can't increase 23 24 their nonconformity.

1 | SECRETARY STACY: Right. Right.

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MS. LAND: So anything -- that boils down to anything that they do to increase what they are doing has to fall into the -- at least the setbacks. Not heights and all those things. But it gets a little weird about not increasing your nonconformity if you're -- well, I guess maybe not.

If you're a grocery store and you want to be a bigger grocery store, you can do that. But you can't turn into a farm implement store on the side. That would change -- it would increase your nonconformity. You know, as long as it's the same use.

So houses shouldn't have any problem. But they would have a problem I guess if they decided they wanted to become -- you know, break the house into apartments or something. Then that's increasing your nonconformity.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Uh-huh.

MS. LAND: Yeah.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So this section -this letter B says any expanded portion -- any
expanded portion of the structure shall therefore -thereafter conform to the regulations of the district

1 in which it is located.

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That's -- the way I read that, that is not just area in bulk. That's any rule that would apply to district. That could be General Provisions.

MS. LAND: Is that after moving it?

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: What's that?

MS. LAND: Is that after moving it? Is that that section?

9 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: This is in the blue 10 book.

11 | SECRETARY STACY: Oh, no.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: I'm just saying. A line like that that says, "...conform to the regulations for the district in which it is located." That's all regulation, so that's General Provisions. That's General Exceptions. That's the book. Is that a fair statement?

MS. LAND: Yeah.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So, at that point, you would have to follow all the rules of the book. You would still be allowed to expand, but you would have to -- then you would have to add something where they'd have to be limited by -- they'd have to stay on the same parcel of land. This is not something we can

SECRETARY STACY: Okay.

MS. LAND: -- you would have to probably get a change. If you change one section completely, though, you wouldn't have to have another vote. That could just be an amendment.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Okay.

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MS. LAND: You know, you might want to just let it ride as it is, and then see how often it comes up as an issue. You can deal with most of those issues as area variances until you decide that -- you know, if you have one in the next five years, then there's no point in messing with the book.

But if you have them come along every couple of months that people have an issue with it, then you might want to look at taking the book and altering it to fit what -- that's why it's living; it has to move to fit what the community needs.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So Dave's neighbor, that would be a case for applying for a variance.

There's a -- he would be eligible?

MS. LAND: That would be a Use Variance, so yeah.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: You're not a fan of
Use Variances?

MS. LAND: No, I'm not. But Use Variances

are -- they do have their purpose. They are for, like, an exception kind of thing, but it's not the same as an exception.

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Where the spirit of the book is not -- is penalizing one particular person. And at the beginning, when you first have a book, there are some times when there are -- especially with nonconforming uses where there is a place for a Use Variance because he has his shop. He's perfectly able to do it -- just using this guy as an example. He can function. We put in zoning, and suddenly he can't grow. So it wasn't his doing.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Okay.

MS. LAND: He was already there. He was established. He's allowed to be there. He could ask for a variance because of something that is required for him to be bigger. They're still not the best, but if there's only one, you don't want to change the book for only one.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: The way it's currently written, though, anybody that lives in an Industrial District or Business District would not be able to put an addition on their house the way they are?

1 MS. LAND: Probably not.

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CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So I don't think we're going to run into it, it's only one, long term.

MS. LAND: Long-term probably not. No.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: So I think this is something that takes a lot of thought. I guess I'm kind of putting it out there as we have more meetings before the hearing.

SECRETARY STACY: Uh-huh.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Think about it.

SECRETARY STACY: Yeah.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: I think, again, it's not completely thought out, but my thoughts were that if you had to follow the Schedule of Regulations, the Area In Bulk, whatever you want to call it, you had to follow the General Provisions, General Exceptions, if you had to stay on your parcel of land, you couldn't grow past your parcel of land, and, then, throw a percentage on it as well, you know, 25 percent of your lot coverage, or 50 percent growth of what you currently are. I don't -- I don't know what that looks like. Just -- we all know somebody that's going to want to add onto their house or grow their building or their business or whatever.
