MS. LAND: You've made it very readily available to anybody -- to anybody who wants to see it. Anybody who says that they didn't have access to it then wasn't trying very hard. So...

She told me she had a contact that that's what they do to get these other mailing lists.

I've touched base with her several different

times and, as of right now, it appears that there seems to be a hiccup in that this contact was trying to tell them that there were 9,000 residents in Allen Township. I kind of don't think that's the case.

MS. LAND: It's probably the census number. Even that's kind of high.

SECRETARY STACY: So -- yeah.

MS. LAND: That's way high.

SECRETARY STACY: And she is making sure it's for Hancock County. Because she said, Do you realize there's three Allen Townships in the State of Ohio. I said, Well, I didn't know that -- did not, but --

MS. LAND: Only three? I thought there'd be more.

SECRETARY STACY: She said there's three in Ohio. I said, The only one I'm interested in is the one in Hancock County. So I'm trying to work through that, that other -- that Every Door thing -- let's see, what is it. Every Door Direct Mailing, that -- we checked that out while I was in with Mark -- with Teresa. She pulled that up and that's all done by mail routes. So sometimes a mail route will encompass a different township and it will only have -- it's

very difficult to even see streets. And what she said, Well, you'll -- if you do that, some people will get it that don't need it, and some people who need it won't get it. So I wasn't overly pleased with that.

That's why I was so excited when she said she had had a contact for the actual -- just the residents in Allen Township. We have to buy it. It's a mailing list. But I thought it was well worth doing that. So I'm still spinning my wheels. I think I may go to another --

MS. LAND: The auditor's office can't give you a list of all addresses in Allen Township? I am almost positive they can produce that list.

SECRETARY STACY: Okay. I will try it. She made it sound, like, very easy because, obviously, they would -- that information would be printed on the mailer so it wouldn't be like we would be applying labels or anything like that, so that made it attractive. They could even include the postage on the balance, you know, doing postage on each one.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: There was one Facebook post that I heard of where this person lives, it will be a Nonconforming Use, and he mentioned that if his house burned down, he would not be able to rebuild there because it's a Nonconforming Use, his house burned down and we said I think it was 75 percent.

MS. LAND: If you still have a basement you've got 75 -- or 25 percent.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Is that something where you're eligible or you could apply for a variance?

MS. LAND: Probably, yeah.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: That's kind of how

I looked at it. I'm, like, if you already lived there

and you wanted to continue --

MS. LAND: Rebuild.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: -- living there, I think that's a pretty easy variance.

MS. LAND: Yeah. Or -- yeah, you have a 75 percent. If you have a one-story house with a basement, the house can be gone, you still have half,

mean, I think I have a general idea, but I've got a

feeling people are going to really get very specific

MS. LAND: Yeah. And this is one of the things you're probably going to run into in a hearing that you're going to have to be cautious about because people are going to be asking you, like, this gentleman did, his specific question; he wants an answer. And if something were to ever happen, God forbid, he's going to try to come back and say, You said I could do X, Y, and Z.

You know, you have -- people will ask and they want their own specific questions. One of the gentlemen that came to the meeting was asking a lot of specific questions that were personal to him.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Right.

MS. LAND: You can't give zoning advice at these hearings. We have to answer in general. You know, if they're asking about Nonconforming Uses, this is what Nonconforming Uses says, and this is how it works.

Or if they're asking about what kind of things can be done in, say, Expressway Service, if I have Expressway Service, would I be allowed to put in a McDonald's? You have to go through and say, In Expressway Service, you're permitted to do X, X, X.

Not, Yes, you can do a McDonald's. That's what they want to hear, but you can't do that.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Right.

MS. LAND: Because you're answering a question in a vacuum because there could be a whole lot of other things that could impact by the time that one question came in.

SECRETARY STACY: Sure.

MS. LAND: It's -- and that's what a lot -- most people don't do that. They're interested in -- but there are -- and we've seen a couple who are just clearly only interested in what it's about for them personally.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Uh-huh.

MS. LAND: And that's fine. I can see that. But you can't give them advice at the hearing.

SECRETARY STACY: Right.

MR. EVANS: Yeah. I think we have to be really careful. It would almost be nice if they could submit questions online to where you could do a little research on it and give the proper answer, but that probably wouldn't happen.

MS. LAND: Any questions that are asked at the hearings that you can't answer off the cuff, ask

them to submit them to you in writing and you can give those to the next hearing and they can be answered there. You can do that.

SECRETARY STACY: That's a good idea.

MS. LAND: But tell them, We are not going to be able to answer fact-specific questions to your situation. We're answering how this kind of section works so they're clear that you can't give them individual zoning advice.

It's almost like legal advice. You can't do that. You don't -- I cannot answer those questions. That would be that -- that would put you guys in a bad spot, me in a bad spot, them saying, But the attorney told me I could do that. Well, that's not exactly what I said. You know, so...

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Right.

MS. LAND: You've got to be -- I have to always preface when I have to answer at these hearings, It depends on the situation at the time but, generally, this is how it works. And maybe that's how you guys can kind of put it, too. It will all depend on the situation in front of us at the time, but our code says this, this, this, and this.

MS. PARGEON: Uh-huh.

MS. LAND: And that way -- because the vacuum -- answering questions in a vacuum is the worst possible thing you could do for everybody.

SECRETARY STACY: Right.

MS. LAND: Because they might depend on something that isn't really the case and, then, you also are kind of held to something that doesn't really apply when the perspective or perception of what something is is different. It depends.

I had a college professor who always said,

It depends on whose ox is being gored. You know, it

depends on how you look at something, and we've got to

be careful of that.

SECRETARY STACY: That makes sense.

MS. LAND: How you answer.

SECRETARY STACY: Sure.

MR. EVANS: Seems like we might be able to answer very general questions, but other than that --

MS. PARGEON: We can't.

MR. EVANS: -- it's like you have to be very careful because what happens if we say, Yes, that could be done on your property?

MS. LAND: Yeah. And then they want to do that and it turns out, really what they wanted to do

was that but it has all this other stuff associated with it. That changes the answer.

MR. EVANS: So then what happens?

MS. LAND: Then they're, like, But you said I could. And we've got to be careful to say, Well, we have to wait to see what the application actually says. But this is what our code says about what kind of a thing you're talking about and see if you fit in there. And this is what our code says. We can't make that decision for you. You have to look at it and make the application. And it will aggravate people a little.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: Yes. Yes. I was thinking that.

MS. LAND: But I think it will only aggravate the people who are really truly wanting you to give them some hard-and-fast answer, and most people don't. I mean, if there's somebody that's got something in the works, they might.

MR. EVANS: It seems like -- it looks like you're going to be trying to hide something. But what you're actually doing is making sure I want to give you the right answer for your -- what you're asking.

CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: You're not going to

- 3 CHAIRPERSON TIMMERMAN: That's what it's 4 going to come down to.
- MR. EVANS: Like I said, we just have to be careful.
  - MS. LAND: Yeah. I think if I look at you and say, I'm going to want to build two sheds on my property, and I'm going to want them, you know, one behind my house and one somewhere over here, is that something I'm able to do? And you're going to have to look at me and say, Well, we're going to have to -- This is what it says about Accessory Buildings and, then, each situation is different. We'll have to see actually what it is before anybody can tell you yes or no on something like that. These are the rules that we'll follow to determine if it's something you can do.
- 19 And that way --
- 20 MS. PARGEON: That's the only way you can do 21 it.
- MS. LAND: Some people -- some people may
  still get agitated that, You didn't give me an answer
  telling me yes or no. But that's just not something

you guys can ever do. And it's also not your place to do it; it's the zoning inspector's. That's something the zoning inspector will look at the area and, then, apply this code to it and determine what you can and can't do, and then we'll give you advice on what you can and can't do.

I live in Marion Township. I wanted to put in a shed in our bark yard. We live on a corner lot so any shed would look like it's sitting in the middle of our backyard because of all of the setbacks. The zoning inspector came and showed us areas where we could put it that made more sense, and I'm like, Oh, okay. Well, we'll take that one over there. Yeah. So...

We don't want somebody to come in and put a foundation and leave it there for five years and say, Yeah, that existed before. Now I can build my house there. It has to continuously be diligently pursued.
